#### Reflections

This weeks Gospel reading begins by refreshing our memory - repeating the last verse from last week's reading (should you have forgotten it!) 'I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty.

If you have some bread, take a piece and think about what's gone into making it what it is. Bread has ingredients.

The ingredients of bread are found in many recipes. They are useful and have their purpose within different foods that we eat and enjoy.

To make bread, the separate ingredients, in just the right quantities and combination are blended together; kneaded and left to rise and mature; then moulded and shaped by the maker.

But bread is only useful once it's been subjected to the heat of an oven – tested and changed.

The religious leaders (described simply as Jews by John) thought they knew about Jesus! But he was more than the ingredients of his mother and father and the town in which he grew up. Jesus described himself as the 'bread of life'. He had specific qualities that made him who he was, 'ingredients' found in the image and nature of God who moulded, shaped and perfected a human form from God's very self — Jesus, God's Son, the bread of life - more than the sum of the 'obvious' human ingredients.

But the ingredients that made Jesus are the ingredients we need in order to be able to imitate Jesus - above and beyond genetics. We are made in the image of God and we all possess something of the qualities, the 'ingredients' that made up Jesus.

Following and imitating Jesus (our example) closely, putting ourself into his hands and presence as much as we can, asking him to mould us and shape in us a Christ-like character will enable us to demonstrate that quality of life that is able to discern what is truly good and bring heaven to earth. Here we create the kingdom of God on earth, as a foretaste of the quality of eternal life that Jesus says can be ours if we believe in him. He wants our lives to be nourished by the ingredients that make Jesus who he is – bread to nourish the world.

Now, the passage from Paul's letter to the Ephesians contrasts two ways of living and reminds us that whatever our desires, for physical food or spiritual sustenance, there are certain demands which God makes on us when we claim to be made in the mould created by Jesus. Those new Christians in Ephesus were to behave differently from those around them. Their joy was to be found in being filled with the Spirit as they participated in the life of Christ. These are the conditions of a life in community – then and now - the ingredients that are pleasing to God: truth, honesty, honest work, true conversation, kindness, tender-heartedness, love. These resonate with the fruits of the Spirit – love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control (Galatians 5: 22 - 23)

Like the early Christians in Ephesus, in all we do we are to imitate God as God is made known to us in Jesus – we are to be bread for the world, scattered in our communities as living witnesses and imitators of Christ. It is what we do with the ingredients that made up Jesus and therefore make up the Christian life is what matters. Bread goes stale unless it us used - and nobody likes stale bread. Likewise, the 'bread' we offer to the world, made from the ingredients God has given us to

shape and form us, will be stale and useless in our communities unless we are used. So, in order *not* to become 'stale' we must allow ourselves to be blended and moulded again and again in God's shaping and skilful hands, made useful as we are subjected to the heat of life a lived 'differently' – tested and changed as we imitate Christ, a controversial character, a fly in the ointment of the leaders and rulers, an unwanted ingredient, who was himself tested and changed by the heat of friction through opposition.

Imitating God, as children imitate a parent, is closely related to the thought throughout John's Gospel. Believers are children of God and as such they – we – are to love one another, as Christ has loved them.
