Zechariah's Story: Luke 1: 8 - 20

Bible Reading: Luke 3:1-6

In the fifteenth year of the reign of Tiberius Caesar – when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, Herod tetrarch of Galilee, his brother Philip tetrarch of Iturea and Traconitis, and Lysanias tetrarch of Abilene – ² during the high-priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness. ³ He went into all the country around the Jordan, preaching a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. ⁴ As it is written in the book of the words of Isaiah the prophet:

'A voice of one calling in the wilderness,
"Prepare the way for the Lord,
make straight paths for him.

⁵ Every valley shall be filled in, every mountain and hill made low.

The crooked roads shall become straight, the rough ways smooth.

⁶ And all people will see God's salvation."'

Reflections

John was always going to be a special child, news that he would be born in near impossible circumstances was brought by a messenger from God, an Angel. So, we're not surprised to hear about him again a bit later on in Luke's account of the events surrounding Jesus' coming among us as a baby and as he approached his work of ministry and mission for God.

John the Baptist seems to have been quite a character - a caricature even. Perhaps more than any other New Testament character we can easily picture him standing there in the desert, rough and ready in his camel hair clothes, probably a bit thin and wild looking on account of his odd diet, preaching. I imagine him shouting his message! He certainly

doesn't seem like someone you'd easily overlook, and he seemed to be getting his message across.

But, no matter what his following was, how compelling he was, his role was to point to Jesus – the one who would follow and be greater than him.

Today, as in Bible times, messengers (people who bear God's good news to the world - like the one called for in Isaiah and like John the Baptist) shout <u>out</u> about the need for us to make the rough places smooth, to level the playing field for humankind and call for us to let God in so that God can change our ways.

Sometimes the messengers are organisations, as well as individuals, who point to Christ. And, in pointing to Christ, they point us to those who Jesus longs to see in right relationships with God, and with every neighbour. They point us to Christ, whose face we see in every person throughout the world today, whose plight makes us want to cry out for the sort of justice and fairness that Jesus exemplified 2,000 years ago.

Christian Aid is one organisation shouting out and pointing us to Christ, in the faces of those for whom everyday life is a struggle, and calling us to respond.

Like the prophets of old, they, among others, have a vision for transformation and they need us to play our part, so that the transformation they, and we, pray for can be achieved.

I'm sure you can think of individuals who have transformed the lives of others, sometimes just the people closest to them, and sometimes many, many lives. People like Ghandi, or Nelson Mandela, have brought about change. We know this has not been without its casualties as they have taken a role in trying to level the playing field, so that a fairer and more just society can be brought about for the majority.

You'll be able to think of people, I'm sure, who are making a difference as they speak out and work for justice for all of God's beloved creation today.

And I'm quite sure you'll be able to think of people who have transformed your life through their work or their message - people whose faith has been infectious.

Maybe there are people who have been bearers of God's good news to you, people who have pointed you to Jesus, because, after all Christians, Christ's followers (me and you) are the ones called to point beyond ourselves - despite and with *our* flaws and foibles - to Jesus whose example teaches us that we are called to grapple with any unjust structures that oppress and exclude people. We are the ones with the responsibility for levelling the playing field, so that God's kingdom can be built on earth as it is in heaven – a place of fulness of life for *everyone*.

Our task, like John the Baptist's, is to point to Christ, pointing out and being active where Christ would be active today, and bringing about the transformations that Jesus demonstrated as he embraced those who were forced to live a life *less* than the life God intended for the people God loved into being - people excluded from their community because of their illness, or disability, or morals, or race, or status, or work.

The Gospel writers tell us the Good News about Jesus Christ, the Son of God, describing what that Good News is in practical ways, through lives turned around in unexpected and remarkable ways - fishermen turned into miracle workers; women allowed to learn; people healed and restored to the community; people forgiven; a Tax collector returning his ill-gotten gains - I could go on!

I wonder, what do you think would be Good News in some situations around the world? What in the world makes you want to cry out to God?

Some time ago, on 'Thought for the day', or some such thing, a contributor said "Indifferent people cannot make a difference". How true! The world's blind indifference to the plight of a world straining under the powers of greed, intolerance and selfishness can only be transformed by the *concerned* and *active* difference we each make - even through the simple choices we make every day about what we buy, our food, our clothes, or where we invest our money, where we give our money or our time or our love.

The world is desperate for words and work that can bring about fresh hope - activity that will transform. It doesn't even have to be transformation on a grand scale, every positive action can build up and up until eventually our actions level the playing field, raising up those in the metaphorical valley and lowering those on their metaphorical mountain top. Wherever we see wrong we should consider how, with integrity, we might set it right.

Our understanding of God and God's love for the world should frame our understanding of who we are and what our calling is, and help us frame our understanding the world.

Faced with huge challenges, we're tempted to think that there's nothing we can do, that it's too late or too hard. Just imagine what the prophets of the Bible would have to say to that! They were never shy of telling people to change their ways, repent, turn their lives around and orientate their lives to God's ways for living. Their faith in God was so strong that they inspired people to hope, when they'd forgotten how to. And they pointed people to God, just as we must as God's messengers today. Like the prophets of old, we *too* have a mission of hope for *transformed* communities.

So, I wonder, what source of hope can we bring? What is the voice we as a Church can find in order to bring about the fresh hope and the transformation that's required to bring love and dignity to our communities?

We see signs of hope in the commitment and care <u>we</u> have for one another. But what more we can do to bring faith, hope and love to the lives of others? And can we be a prophetic voice?

What needs changing to level the playing field and prepare the way for the Lord, for kingdom values on earth, such that God's joy when human life flourishes is part of our mission.

What obstacles can we remove from the path, so that people will be able to hear about and meet Jesus?

We have a message to pass on, a message of transformative hope that can point people to God, people whose voice we hear in the cries of those who feel they are in a wilderness, people who really need to know God's great love for them, people on our own doorstep.

True prophets help us to imagine what a renewed earth would be like, so that we'd take every opportunity and give anything to work for it, for God's sake and for the sake of everything and everyone that God loves.

Holding the World in Prayer
