The 2023 United Reformed Church General Assembly took place from 30th June to 3rd July at The Hayes Conference Centre in Swanwick. As usual there is a group from Yorkshire Synod representing us all and in time we hope that we can let you all know how it went, what we felt when discussing the future of the URC and how we can help you all be part of that journey. Some of the key items

discussed were Legacies of Slavery and proposals for repairing justice such as mandatory anti-racism training; ways to support the Transcarpathian Reformed Church in Ukraine; opposition to the Illegal

Migration Bill; the rights of Trans-gender people and proposals for a formal ministry of URC Children's, Youth and/or Family Minister as well as the Church Life Review. One thing of joy for us in Yorkshire Synod was the induction as Moderator of General Assembly of Rev Tessa Henry-Robinson, who many of you will know from her time in the SPACE group of churches when her husband Rev Mark Robinson was minister there.

Making More Disciples

The **Elders Development Group of the Yorkshire Synod** are delighted to invite you to attend the annual 24 hour conference to be held at Wydale Hall (https://www.wydale.org/) in North

Yorkshire on **28**th **to 29**th **September 2023**. It will be led by Andrew Roberts, author of Holy Habits (https://www.holyhabits.org.uk/andrew-roberts) and the topic will be 'Making More Disciples'.



In Andrew's own words:

"Lucy Moore (the founder of Messy Church) suggests that 'Many of us face an inner conflict about the imperative to 'make disciples of all nations' (Matthew 28:19). There can be a little voice in us that wants more people to become Christian for selfish reasons – to keep the local church going. But God's call to Abram was to 'be a blessing'. What difference might it make to our mission if we set out in faith simply to 'be a blessing'?"

This question will be explored in the light of biblical texts, wisdom from various writers, stories and our own experiences though conversation and plenty of space for personal reflection in keeping with the relaxed atmosphere of the retreat.

The conference will start with lunch on Thursday 28th September, and finish after lunch on Friday, 29th. Places are limited and will be allocated on a first-come, first-served basis. Each church will be restricted to three places, until we can review demand. There is no charge for this conference as the Yorkshire Synod are paying for this residential.

Attendees will need to make their own way to Wydale Hall. In terms of accommodation, each room is ensuite. There are some rooms specifically for those with mobility needs.

Emerging Adults

In the third of her articles from the 18-25 Project for the Synod Briefing (and elsewhere in Synod), Rev Samantha Sheehan explores the Christian journey of those in their 20's and 30's.

Friends the reality is that our young people who are connected with our congregations are going to leave at some point. It's just going to happen. For many different reasons.

Some will leave because they are moving away for further education, some will leave because of work commitments, some for the reasons we explored last month (Exile or



Exodus). Some will leave because their spiritual growth is needing something else, they may feel called somewhere else. Some will leave because of family changes, beginning a new relationship or the end of a relationship. We could go on... there are many different reasons why people leave congregations, and many more for young people especially as they journey through their late teens and early twenties.

If we travel back in time to the 1960/70's we could say that by the time a young person reached their early 20's then they would have completed their education, gained long term employment, financially independent, living outside the parental home, and most likely be married with their first child. Fully entering their adulthood.

Fast forward today, this no longer the case, according to the <u>Office of National Statistics</u> in 2019 the average age of marriage was 34 years for men and 32 years for women. Same-sex couples an average age is 38 years for men and 33 years for women.

Added to this is the prolonged time of education with an increased number of 18 year olds attending University for an undergraduate degree (3yrs) and possible post graduate (1-2yrs). Employment also looks different, with the desire to seek a job which pays well and is also enjoyable and fulfilling may lead to multiple short-term employments in close succession and periods of unemployment.

Not to mention the unstable housing market, the challenge of saving a deposit for a mortgage, on top of the significant debt incurred from attending university, all impacting on feeling financially independent and able to fully vacate that parental home.

Our young people are living through this extending time of no longer adolescents but not quiet adult. Psychologist Jeffery Arnett has called this life stage – <u>Emerging Adulthood</u> – an in-between age.

All of this has an effect on faith and congregation belonging.

So much of what we do as congregation (mostly unconsciously) is aimed towards the 1970's assumption that young people quickly enter their adulthood and settle into employment, relationship and stable housing. Where once this happened within a 5years period now can take well over 10years. Where once someone was settling into adulthood in their early 20's it is now taking them into their 30's and beyond.

This offers challenges for the church of today:

- How are we helping our children and young people grow a faith which will journey with them during this time of change?
- What can we offer into this time of uncertainty? What biblical stories speak into times of transition and uncertainty?
- Where might there be points of connection?

RECONNECT!: a URC event for 20-40s

Saturday 16th September 2023, 10am-4.30pm

Westminster College, Cambridge

We are delighted to be hosting the first URC event for those in their 20s-40s, generously funded by the URC's Discipleship Development Fund.

Reconnect! is a discipleship event with worship, Bible study, panel discussion and small-group discussions. It aims to provide a space for 20-40 year olds to make connections with other Christians, to share in fellowship, and to discuss church life and faith in the context of life in this age bracket. We are hoping to establish an ongoing supportive network that will nourish people in their everyday discipleship and local church life.

Who is this for? Anyone in their 20s-40s who is connected with or interested in the URC, particularly those who have recently left Youth Assembly and those who do not have much contact with a local URC.

When will it be? Saturday 16th September 2023 with the option of staying over from 6pm the night before (Friday 15th) if you are coming from a distance.

Where will it take place? At Westminster College in Cambridge, one of the URC's Resource Centres for Learning.

Why is it happening? The report from the 20-40s task group to General Assembly in 2018 explored the reasons for the lack of 20-40 year olds in traditional churches and emphasised the need to walk together in community. Lack of engagement with traditional church is not a problem that needs fixing, but rather a call to find new ways forward together.

Reconnect! will be an opportunity for those in their 20s-40s to worship and socialise together, but also to think together about future discipleship and fellowship events and how the URC might better support and encourage those in this age-group.

LEGO CHURCH AT KIRKHEATON

Revd Sue Pegg has been in touch to celebrate the faith journey of Gracie, a young person aged 17 years, who with her family attends The United Church (Methodist/URC) in Kirkheaton Huddersfield. Having just completed her GCSE's last year Gracie was looking for some part time work while she studied at college for her A Levels and heard of the *One Programme* which encourages young people to get involved in Christian Ministry and offers them three hours of paid work weekly over a twelve month period. She was encouraged to apply as she wanted to offer something creative for our church children on Sunday mornings.



It was suggested that **Lego Church** might be a good way forward. Gracie has always related well to people of all ages, particularly children and is creative, so **Lego Church** seemed ideal.

She was accepted onto the Programme and attended an induction day. During the year she has been to several residentials for young Christians and made new friends. Throughout the programme Gracie has valued the support of many, and the encouragement she has received has enabled her to grow in confidence and in her Christian faith over the last year. On Sunday mornings the children meet with members of the church family for worship and then go on to enjoy **Lego**

Church in the **Lego Room** with Gracie. The **Lego Room** was decorated by her in bright exciting colours and on a Lego theme.


She reads a Bible Story and then the little ones make a Lego model about it and sometimes do other

crafts too. Later the group re-join the main service and share what they have learned with the church family and explain their models. Gracie heads up this feedback time and can now articulate well to a group. The little ones love Lego

Church finding it fun and exciting.

As Gracie comes to the end of an exciting year she is beginning to apply for University places and at her first interview she was asked about **Lego Church** and the *One Programme* and those interviewing were very interested in what she had been doing and impressed by it. They encouraged her to include it on her CV.

Everyone involved in Gracie's story are proud of all she has achieved and the little ones, their parents and all at The United Church Kirkheaton have certainly benefitted not just from her skills but from the joy of being part of this stage of Gracie's faith journey.





Locally Recognised Worship Leader Commissioned

Yorkshire Synod Discipleship Development Grant funds 2023

The **Discipleship Development Funds** are intended to contribute to the development of lay people and therefore the purposes for which it can be used are as broad as can be generated by creativity and vocation, in line with the aims of the URC's Discipleship Development Strategy (DDS), which are to equip the people of the United Reformed Church to:

- Create opportunities for everyone to encounter the living God, whether they already identify themselves as followers of Christ or not.
- Encourage everyone in their prayer life and relationship with God to enable them to live as disciples of Jesus.
 - Encourage everyone to make the most of education opportunities that are relevant and appropriate for them in their discipleship journey.

The eligible costs would include, without being restricted to:

- National or denominational learning events, conferences or programmes developed in-house;
- Personnel costs;
- Courses (at any level) at any of the United Reformed Church Resource Centres for Learning or other suitable learning providers;
- Books, equipment and resources related to a particular topic or activity;
- Attendance at Synod learning events; and
- Travel costs for attending learning events.

Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme

The £42 million Government <u>Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme</u> has undergone a digital transformation with the development of a new website and application portal.

- The new website makes it easier to navigate and find the information from scheme eligibility to application guidance. The website sits on the <u>gov.uk</u> domain, providing reassurance this is an official and trusted website.
- The new application portal will enable applicants to apply online. This will follow the same familiar format as the PDF form, but will be easier to process than downloading and completing a physical document. The option to use the old PDF will remain, but the application portal is planned to be more efficient with all the information and attachments uploaded and submitted in one place.

Please note that the website is now easier to use and the online portal is *in addition* to the paper-based method of application.



Yorkshire Churches Day (YCD) is a chance for every place of worship in the county to open up and showcase the amazing history and heritage found inside their buildings. It is a day to tell stories and bring to life the variety, beauty, history and sheer wonder of Yorkshire's churches, chapels and places of worship. As part of the HOD remit, entry to your event must be free, but there are many ways you can engage your visitors and encourage donations.



Number 84: A Residential Missional Community





Is New Monasticism catching your attention? Does being part of a small innovative residential missional community appeal?

Does taking time out to think and pray through new possibilities, or taking a gap year feel timely?

Are you excited by new ways of being and doing Church?

From Spring 2023 onwards for those aged 18 and over, Redcar has a rare opportunity in the Northern Synod of the United Reformed Church to become part of a household of three living within a simple Rule of praying, eating, studying and serving together while accompanying Redcar United Reformed Church & Redcar Baptist Church in missional presence in Redcar. The residents of Number 84 will form a Jesus-shaped community. This will be an experience of incarnational living whereby the members of the household will live amongst their

neighbours with biblical imagination. They will order their communal life according to a rhythm of daily prayer, bible study, shared meals and purposeful service. In addition to having time to reflect on their own walk with God and to further their own discipleship, the residents will commit to praying for and serving their community through finding work in the town which may be paid or voluntary. They will worship and fellowship with the URC/Baptist church which is located next door to the house.

In these ways Number 84 will be a household that prays, studies, serves and lives together in God's love. It will be a Fresh Expression of church within the Northern Synod of the United Reformed Church. The Synod will exercise pastoral care and oversight of the household. If needed, a modest maintenance allowance is available.
