Through feedback it was clear that "it felt a safe space", there were "helpful links between the Old and New Testament and ideas for sharing in services" and the event "made us feel part of the wider URC family". Not only that, but "lots of food for thought – refreshing to have such open and real conversations", "good to be with old friends and make new ones" and "lots to consider when we get back home".

Making More Disciples

The **Elders Development Group of the Yorkshire Synod** are delighted to invite you to attend the annual 24 hour conference to be held at Wydale Hall (https://www.wydale.org/) in North

Yorkshire on **28**th **to 29**th **September 2023**. It will be led by Andrew Roberts, author of Holy Habits (https://www.holyhabits.org.uk/andrew-roberts) and the topic will be 'Making More Disciples'.



In Andrew's own words:

"Lucy Moore (the founder of Messy Church) suggests that 'Many of us face an inner conflict about the imperative to 'make disciples of all nations' (Matthew 28:19). There can be a little voice in us that wants more people to become Christian for selfish reasons – to keep the local church going. But God's call to Abram was to 'be a blessing'. What difference might it make to our mission if we set out in faith simply to 'be a blessing'?"

This question will be explored in the light of biblical texts, wisdom from various writers, stories and our own experiences though conversation and plenty of space for personal reflection in keeping with the relaxed atmosphere of the retreat.

The conference will start with lunch on Thursday 28th September, and finish after lunch on Friday, 29th. Places are limited and will be allocated on a first-come, first-served basis. Each church will be restricted to three places, until we can review demand. There is no charge for this conference as the Yorkshire Synod are paying for this residential.

Attendees will need to make their own way to Wydale Hall. In terms of accommodation, each room is ensuite. There are some rooms specifically for those with mobility needs.

RECONNECT!: a URC event for 20-40s

Saturday 16th September 2023, 10am-4.30pm

Westminster College, Cambridge

We are delighted to be hosting the first URC event for those in their 20s-40s, generously funded by the URC's Discipleship Development Fund.

Reconnect! is a discipleship event with worship, Bible study, panel discussion and small-group discussions. It aims to provide a space for 20-40 year olds to make connections with other Christians, to share in fellowship, and to discuss church life and faith in the context of life in this age bracket. We are hoping to establish an ongoing supportive network that will nourish people in their everyday discipleship and local church life.

Who is this for? Anyone in their 20s-40s who is connected with or interested in the URC, particularly those who have recently left Youth Assembly and those who do not have much contact with a local URC.

When will it be? Saturday 16th September 2023 with the option of staying over from 6pm the night before (Friday 15th) if you are coming from a distance.

Where will it take place? At Westminster College in Cambridge, one of the URC's Resource Centres for Learning.

Why is it happening? The report from the 20-40s task group to General Assembly in 2018 explored the reasons for the lack of 20-40 year olds in traditional churches and emphasised the need to walk together in community. Lack of engagement with traditional church is not a problem that needs fixing, but rather a call to find new ways forward together.

Reconnect! will be an opportunity for those in their 20s-40s to worship and socialise together, but also to think together about future discipleship and fellowship events and how the URC might better support and encourage those in this age-group.

Herringthorpe URC's Church Away Weekend 2023



From 23-25 June, 38 members and friends from Herringthorpe URC, Rotherham, gathered at The Hayes Conference Centre in Swanwick, Derbyshire, for our Church Away Weekend. We started on Friday evening with dinner and an icebreaker game, before moving into worship and our opening session. Our speakers for the weekend were Mike & Alison Davies, who are part of the 24-7 Prayer Network and who lead a prayer community in

Nottingham. Mike began by getting us to explore our feelings around prayer. It turns out that most of us struggle with prayer and feel guilty for not praying enough! Thankfully, on Saturday, Mike and Alison led us in 3 sessions that would help us connect with God in deeper ways. We explored the themes of Intimacy with God, Walking and Being Real, and Praying in Community.

Mike and Alison's sessions were very practical. After some introductory teaching, there was space to simply be with God. Alison had prepared some prayer stations for us, and offered us a range of different tools and techniques to help us connect and engage with our Heavenly Father.

Alongside the adult sessions, the children explored the theme of prayer by looking at the Lord's Prayer, as well as three encounters with God in scripture: Blind Bartimaeus hearing Jesus's question "What do you want me to do for you?"; young Samuel hearing God in the Temple; and the thief on the cross who recognised Jesus' kingship and asked to be remembered in God's kingdom.





On Saturday afternoon, between sessions, there was some free time, with people heading off for walks or to visit local attractions, and on Saturday evening we had a range of party games that were great fun! These free/social slots helped build deeper relationships between church members across the generations, and there was space for pastoral conversations too.

Yorkshire Synod Discipleship Development Grant funds 2023

The **Discipleship Development Funds** are intended to contribute to the development of lay people and therefore the purposes for which it can be used are as broad as can be generated by creativity and vocation, in line with the aims of the URC's Discipleship Development Strategy (DDS), which are to equip the people of the United Reformed Church to:

- Create opportunities for everyone to encounter the living God, whether they already identify themselves as followers of Christ or not.
- Encourage everyone in their prayer life and relationship with God to enable them to live as disciples of Jesus.
 - Encourage everyone to make the most of education opportunities that are relevant and appropriate for them in their discipleship journey.

The eligible costs would include, without being restricted to:

- National or denominational learning events, conferences or programmes developed in-house;
- Personnel costs;
- Courses (at any level) at any of the United Reformed Church Resource Centres for Learning or other suitable learning providers;
- Books, equipment and resources related to a particular topic or activity;
- Attendance at Synod learning events; and
- Travel costs for attending learning events.

NEW LOCAL ECUMENICAL PARTNERSHIP IN SKIPTON

On Sunday 16th July after a special Skipton & Grassington Methodist Circuit Service at Cracoe Village Hall in the beautiful Yorkshire Dales, the Methodist Church congregation at Trinity Church on Westmorland Street in Skipton joined the existing Local Ecumenical Partnership of St Andrew's Skipton which had been created way back at Pentecost 1975 with the coming together of Skipton URC, Broughton Road Methodist Church and Gargrave Road Methodist Church on the current Newmarket Street site.



Moving forward the enlarged LEP will be known as **Trinity St Andrew's** and brings together the missional activity of the two churches so that the work of both denominations can be more effective in the town.

Rev'd Andrew Webb said of the new LEP: "Trinity St Andrew's is excited about coming together as one congregation. It is an opportunity to share resources and to refocus on mission activities in our local community. Hopefully reducing our number of buildings and management roles will give renewed energy to engage in God's calling to share his transforming love."



The signing of the new constitution was led by Rev'd Kerry Tankard, the Chair of the Yorkshire West District, who was joined by Rev'd Jamie Kissack, Moderator of the Yorkshire Synod of the United Reformed Church, Rev'd Andrew Webb, the minister of both joining churches, Neil Platt of St Andrew's and Eileen Lloyd of Trinity.

HEYWOOD URC and their GRAVEYARD

Each week, a group of up to 10 volunteers from Chapel and the community, meet up on a Tuesday morning to maintain the graveyard at the rear of Heywood United Reformed Church, Northowram, which is near Halifax. Led by Alan Rushworth who lives opposite the Chapel, the group continue to do sterling work over this large site, which is much appreciated by the members, as well as the many visitors.



Recent plans has been the creation of a Quiet Area at the request of families who regularly visit loved ones' graves, plus an adjacent wild flower meadow which has brought vibrant coloured plants for visitors to appreciate.

The group, with the encouragement of the Church Meeting, approached the Woodland Trust earlier this year, who have kindly agreed to donate a variety of 30 small trees this autumn,

which will be planted at the top end of the site near to the boundary. On their website, the Woodland Trust has this statement: 'We want to make sure everybody in the UK has the chance to plant a tree. So we're giving away hundreds of thousands of trees to schools and communities.

Together, we'll get millions more trees in the ground'. They have recognised the value of this site to the local community as well as appreciating that this is a partnership scheme between the Chapel and the neighbourhood.

The small fellowship at Heywood are indebted to the incredible work undertaken on their behalf by this committed group of volunteers, which, in turn, is of great benefit to the village of Northowram and fully supported and commended by them.
