

## URC :: Spirituality

#### broadening and deepening prayer

Spirituality in the Reformed tradition covers a wide range: it includes people who are enriched by deep explorations of scripture, or sitting in silence, encountering God in the world, or exploring things in quiet days and retreats.

This new web site brings together some of these strands as a way of encouraging people to broaden and deepen their spirituality. There are ways of interacting with others, taking part in events, sharing something of the spirituality that takes place in private, and looking at spiritual direction. **Members of URC spirituality can join in discussion groups on this site and network with other members.** <u>Click here to join</u>.

**URC spirituality** came into being as a result of a re-visioning of the United Reformed Church Retreat Group, which, earlier in its story, was called the URC Silence and Retreats Network. At the 2023 General Assembly it was agreed that the new Worship Faith & Order committee would have oversight of URC spirituality and that it would report to them on an annual basis. There is an ongoing process of reviewing and renewing this activity and gradually it will be moving out of online-only activity. For example, our website <u>www.urc-spirituality.org.uk</u> could be a place to advertise local retreats, quiet days and other events and place, which would be especially useful for folk on the edges of Synods.

At the moment this is a small group - some still around since the S&R Network days and others invited in and we need to broaden our constituency somewhat. Following on from the success of the URC Training sessions earlier this year, Children's & Youth Work and Education & Learning are offering four new sessions on **RESILIENCE**, led by Alex Clare-Young and Adam Scott.

**Revd Dr Alex Clare-Young** (they/them or just their name) is a URC minister in Special Category Ministry developing a new faith-based community in Cambridge City Centre. Alex is an Associate Tutor at Westminster College and is also a writer, facilitator and activist, creating content around LGBTQ+ identities, neurodiversity, compassionate/trauma awareness and DEI (diversity, equity and inclusion) more broadly. Alex enjoys using creativity - in words, music, craft and design - to express their commitment to social and eco justice and to bring people together.

**Revd Dr Adam Scott** is Principal of Northern College, a NSM URC minister and a chartered psychologist. He loves to explore where psychology and faith intersect and has a particular interest in wellbeing, mindfulness and human flourishing.

#### 10 January 7.15-8.45pm: Compassionate Welcome – with Alex Clare-Young

Compassionate awareness is also known as trauma awareness. We will consider faith-based trauma, safe spaces, brave spaces, and the practice of compassionate welcome together at an introductory level.

#### 17 January 7.15-8.45pm: Inclusive and Expansive Language – with Alex Clare-Young

This is an opportunity for anyone who compiles or writes liturgy, prayer, worship, song or copy in a church context to explore and workshop what our URC commitment to inclusive and expansive language may look like in practice.


## 24 January 7.15-8.45pm: Understanding Wellbeing – with Adam Scott

## SAFEGUARDING

Matt Knowles, our Lead Safeguarding Officer tells us that the team will be providing constant Safeguarding cover to both Yorkshire and Northern Synods throughout the Christmas and New Year period. Each officer will have an out of office message on saying that if there is any issue at all then to contact the generic safeguarding email address at <u>safeguarding.1and4@urc.org.uk</u>

This inbox will be monitored every day over the period (including Christmas Day, Boxing Day and New Year's Day) by a member of the safeguarding team. This member will deal with any issue that is raised at all. This means that any issue will be acted upon quickly and that no church will have to wait until the festive period is finished to get to help and support.

As with everyone else in the Synod, the Safeguarding team will be returning to back to full operating hours on the 2<sup>nd</sup> January 2024.


