


Synod Evangelist-Ashley Evans invites you to Yorkshires LYCiG Day 20th April 2024, 10am -3pm.

TALKING TO A GENERATION

Samantha Sheehan looks at how churches can engage with 18-25-year-olds

t's the ultimate question for the Church: how do we engage with 18-25-year-olds? And like the Ultimate Question of Life, the Universe and Everything in The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy, the answers may well be disappointing and elusive. But this should not stop us from searching, exploring and trying to answer them. Like the mice of Douglas Adams' novel, maybe the answer is in our experiments – in our living and working, in our kingdombuilding and relationships.

Because the answer to this ultimate question is... talk to them. There isn't really any other way of getting to know someone other than to talk to them, to befriend them and show an interest in their lives. Just like you and me, 18-25-year-olds are people. They

are looking for purpose, looking to belong, looking to be a part of something outside themselves (they are not as self-centred as the media makes them out to be).

What we are really wanting to ask is, 'How do we get 18-25-year-olds to come to my church and get involved?' This is not the same question and, for me, is not a kingdom question, it is not a faith question.

But we should ask, 'How do we engage with 18-25-year-olds, with the intention that they will come to know something of God and be a part of kingdom building? In their own way, how might God be using them?'

It starts by talking to them, being prepared to have a conversation, showing an interest in their lives and befriending them. We need to stop waiting for people to show up at our o

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'If this gap is growing, the muscle memory fades' o doors; the traditional church with a set time of worship and gathering no longer works for the majority of people. Faith is a living, breathing part of life and something to be lived out. It is in living out our faith that we have a better chance of making a connection than on a Sunday morning.

Life has changed; life for an 18-25-year-old has changed. If we travel back in time to the 1960s and 70s we could say that by the time a young person reached their early 20s then they would have completed their education, gained long term employment and become financially independent, living outside the parental home. They would most likely be married with their first child. Fully entering their adulthood.

Today, this is no longer the case. According to the Office of National Statistics, in 2019 the average age of marriage was 34 years for men and 32 years for women, and for same-sex couples an average age is 38 years for men and 33 years for women.

Added to this is the prolonged time of education, with an increased number of 18-year-olds attending university for an undergraduate degree and possible postgraduate course. Employment also looks different: the desire for a job which pays well and is enjoyable and fulfilling may lead to multiple short-term employments and periods of unemployment.

Not to mention the unstable housing market, the challenge of saving a deposit for a mortgage, on top of the debt incurred from attending university, all impacting on feeling financially independent and able to fully vacate their parental home.

Young people are living through an extended time of being no longer adolescents but not fully adult. Psychologist Jeffrey Arnett has called this life stage 'Emerging Adulthood' – an in-between age.

All of this has an effect on faith and congregational belonging. So much of what we do as congregations (mostly unconsciously) is aimed towards the 1970s assumption that young people quickly enter their adulthood and settle into employment, a relationship and stable housing. Where once this happened within a five-year period it now can take well over ten years. Where once someone was settling into adulthood in their early 20s, it is now taking them into their 30s and beyond.

Points of contact with church congregations used to be marriage and baptism. A young person may well drift from church during adolescence but would return when they have their own children. If this gap is growing, the muscle memory fades. If, during the time of connection, the young person did not feel valued or encouraged to contribute, they are less likely to think their children will be.

This becomes even more significant with the increased number of children and young people who have never experienced being a part of a congregation in the first place. The idea of church just isn't on their radar. But God is faith is

This offers challenges for the Church of today. How are we helping our children and young people grow a faith which will journey with them during this time of change? What can we offer into this time of uncertainty? What biblical stories speak into times of transition and uncertainty? Where might there be points of connection?

Whether or not we feel we have contact with young adults, having answers to some of these questions is important. Understanding a little about how the world has changed, and some of the challenges and demands facing young adults today, will help us speak into those situations and gives us a right to sit at their table; to listen to their stories and have an opportunity to tell our own story.

Are there celebrations or local points of gathering within the life of the wider community of your village, town or city? How is the church present? Is there an annual festival, a race day, Pride? What might it look like for the church to share in that celebration?

Where is there tension, what are the social justice issues of your location and where is the Church's voice? Does the Church stand on the picket lines, at protests? Do we offer lament at injustice – this is often where we find people, in the messiness of life.

A good place to start and to take stock is pages 22-32 of the 20-40 Task Group Report, presented at the URC General Assembly in 2018. There are a number of questions in the appendix to help begin the conversation.


And if I was to recommend one book, it would be Ruth Perrin's Changing Shape: The faith lives of millennials, which offers an insight into the lives and faith of young adults.



Helping Yorkshire's Historic Churches & Chapels

Good news! Funding available for Yorkshire's Churches

The Yorkshire Historic Churches Trust is welcoming funding applications from places of worship across the county for repair, restoration and maintenance work. Due to the generous donations and legacies received last year, the Trust is actively encouraging churches to apply for the next round of funding.

The application deadlines for 2024 are 8th March for consideration in April and 23rd August for consideration in October grants committee. For guidance and how to apply please go to: www.yhct.org.uk/grants.

Grants are available for repairs to the church fabric, the walls, roofs, floors, tower, bell frames, windows, stonework, repointing and rainwater goods. Grants are also available for the conservation of fixture and fittings, such as monuments, furniture and stained glass and repairs to bells, clocks and organs. Applications are also welcome for investigatory work. You can apply for this type of grant at any time of the year. Do contact Jonathan Stamp by email at grants@yhct.org.uk if you would like to discuss this.

The YHCT have no set funding amounts, but common grants range from £2000 - £10,000, depending on the size of the works. The Grant Committee looks at how much the total project is and how much effort has gone into fund raising locally, and which other funders have been approached or confirmed their grants. The YHCT ideally likes to be able to help a church or chapel who have neared the end of their fund raising and only have a shortfall of say £10 - £15,000 to be able to start their project.

It is also inviting individual churches and chapels to become 'Church Members' and to support the Trust by opening churches on Yorkshire Churches Day on 14 September 2024 or taking part in the Ride and Stride sponsored event. Peak Wesley Way



Looking for a New Home



The Michael Church in Lowedges Sheffield is wanting to offer their organ to someone who can give it a new loving home. It is now no longer used so is available to collect by any fellowship or individual wo can make use of it.

Here comes the technical bit: the organ is a Viscount Grand Opera Rondo Domus 1332 organ with two large speaker boxes. It is 51 inches

high (1.295 metres), width 67 ins (1.702m), depth 30 ins (0.762m), plus the depth of the pedals which adds another 22 inches (0.559m).

There are two speakers 31.5 ins high,

15.5 ins deep and 17.5 ins wide (0.8m x 0.394m x 0.445m).

They are also looking for a new home for some song books; they have in braille Rejoice & Sing hymn books and Mission Praise song books. The books were produced by RNIB and there are 18 folders in the set.

to be part of a continuing and thriving Christian mission based out of the St Albans House Christian Community. The leaders there, Kinder and Gina Kalsi of the Church Army, regularly send me updates, and here are a few extracts of their latest letter.

They are pleased to let us know that they have been joined by a Sheffield Diocese Centenary Project youth worker who will be working to develop youth work for the Centre of Mission and Church of Christ in Darnall. Siân, a commissioned Church Army Evangelist and has recently moved to Sheffield from North Wales where she did youth and families ministry amongst various other things for several years. Sian is a mum of three grown up children and a nanna to her beautiful granddaughter who is four years old.



One of the things Sian will be involved in, will be developing youth connections within *Create Afterschool Church*. Create is going really well, with an established group of 50 or so people aged from 0 to 80. They have been looking at the sayings of Jesus, including the I Am sayings and the beatitudes. At *Create* they are blessed by 2 wonderful ladies who help in the kitchen, and 2 people who are going to help plan the activities each week. As they approach Easter, they will be offering baptism for anyone

who wants to use this to mark where they are in their journey of faith. Thursdays are probably the best day of the week, with Create in the afternoon and in the morning the Toddler group alongside coffee morning. The toddler group is growing, and as some of the older children left, they have had lots of babies come along and it is a joy to watch them develop.

Easter 2024

As they approach Easter, they are planning to join in with the Arise initiative www.arisesheffield.org that aims to prayer walk every street in Sheffield. They will be increasing their prayer walking from 2 to 3 or even 4 times a week, and aim to walk every street in our area, at least once.

Partnership Outreach

They continue to work with partners across the area, including litter picking and environmental groups and the business network. They feel blessed by being part of the network of churches in the area, and meet regularly with the leaders for prayer and to share news and value Church Army cluster – where all members of the Church Army community in the area can gather and share and pray together.

HEYWOOD UNITED REFORMED CHURCH GRAVEYARD



Each week, a group of up to 10 volunteers from Chapel and the community, meet up on a Tuesday morning to maintain the graveyard at the rear of Heywood United Reformed Church, Northowram, which is near Halifax. Led by Alan Rushworth who lives opposite the Chapel, the group continue to do sterling work over this large site, which is much appreciated by the members, as well as the many visitors.

Recent plans have been the creation of a Quiet Area at the request of families who

regularly visit loved ones' graves, plus an adjacent wild flower meadow which has brought vibrant coloured plants for visitors to appreciate (see photos below).

The group, with the encouragement of the Church Meeting, approached the Woodland Trust earlier last year, who have kindly agreed to donate a variety of 30 saplings, which duly arrived last November. The Church members approached the Brownies, which meets on the premises on a Monday evening and asked if they would help out by planting at the top end of the site near to the boundary. They were thrilled to be asked, and a group, along with their leader, under the supervision of Alan Rushworth, planted the 30 saplings.



On their website, the Woodland Trust has this statement: 'We want to make sure everybody in the UK

has the chance to plant a tree. So we're giving away hundreds of thousands of trees to schools and communities. Together, we'll get millions more trees in the ground'. They have recognised the value of this site to the local community as well as appreciating that this is a partnership scheme between the Chapel and the neighbourhood.

The small fellowship at Heywood are indebted to the incredible work undertaken on their behalf by this committed group of

volunteers, which, in turn, is of great benefit to the village of Northowram and fully supported and commended by them.



Funding Resources – Winter & Spring 24

Rev Simon Copley, our Treasurer, has circulated a fuller version of this to all our church treasurers recently, but it is useful to let you all know that there are plenty of resources available to Synod churches to help them through this winter as well as to help them build on any missional initiatives they plan to work on.

1. Synod Funds

The Synod has three sources of grant support that local congregations (including LEPs) can access: **Synod Mission Fund** - this is our go-to funding pot for any projects/posts that help your congregation carry out any aspect of mission in your local community. Both small and larger/multi-year grants are available. **Mission Capacity Fund** - this new fund will support any measure (including back-room, support, organisational changes and administration tasks) that will help release energy for your congregation to engage in mission.

<u>Vision and Opportunity Property Grants</u> - these can be of any size and fund any alteration to church buildings that help congregations engage more effectively in mission.

We recommend a conversation with our Synod Clerk, Tim Crossley (clerk@urcyorkshire.org.uk) about any prospective application to the Synod Mission and Mission Capacity Funds and with Val Morrison, Convenor of the Synod Property Committee (cultum valmorrison7@btinternet.com), about Vision and Opportunity Grants.

2. National URC Funds

The United Reformed Church has national funding streams that any congregation can apply to. The two largest are:

<u>Church Buildings Fund</u> - gives loans, and sometimes grants, towards any building cost. These are usually £25,000 maximum but larger loans and grants can be made. Please ask Simon Copley, the Synod Treasurer, about details of how to apply to these funds (<u>whiteknight copley@hotmail.com</u>). Further information is also available at Church Buildings Fund - United Reformed Church

<u>Legacy Fund</u> - gives grants normally with a limit of £50,000 per application for innovative and ground-breaking mission projects. Further information is available at <u>The Legacy Fund - United Reformed Church</u> where you can download the application form.

There are a number of **other, smaller funds** and details of these can be found at: <u>Grants & funding opportunities - United Reformed Church.</u> Please note that national URC funds tend to be undersubscribed so a well-thought application will have a good chance of success. Please contact Simon (<u>whiteknight_copley@hotmail.com</u>) for advice on how to put your bid together.

3. Trust Funds, Landfill and Lottery Funding etc.

There are a large number of Trusts and Foundations (and other sources) that give grants for community, Christian and environmental causes.

Synod has access to the *Directory of Social Change database* with information about over 4,500 Trusts and Foundations giving grants for the widest possible range of causes.

The database can be accessed by any Congregation. Contact Simon, the Synod Treasurer (whiteknight copley@hotmail.com), and he will be happy to guide you through the access procedure and to give any further advice on how to research the database.



Usually stories which feature graveyards begin with the words **It was a dark and stormy night**, but in this case it was a wet and windy Eccleshill which saw our erstwhile Trust Secretary, Alastair Forsyth, hand over the plans of the former Eccleshill URC Cemetery on Chapel Street to representatives of the newly formed *Friends of Chapel Street Cemetery*. When Eccleshill URC closed in 2021 the site of the church building sold very quickly, but the cemetery,

situated where the original chapel was founded back in 1823, did not garner much interest apart from the Friends, who had taken it on themselves to make the cemetery a haven of peace and tranquillity. Encouraged by the Synod, the *Friends* began to raise funds and incorporated themselves as a charity. This all bore fruit as they are now able to purchase the site so that the work they have begun can continue for the benefit of the villagers in Eccleshill.
