Synod Specials

Before my next Briefing (due out on 23rd October) Synod will be preparing itself for a series of gatherings which encompasses all that Synod represents; from welcoming new ministers, to formal meetings to new experiences.

This coming Saturday 4th October, Synod will be joining the Sheffield Partnership in welcoming Revd Johnny O'Hanlon at his induction service at Central URC. The invitation is here for you all to come along to welcome Johnny into his new role and to join with the Sheffield fellowship in celebrating their witness in that part of the Synod, and I hope to be able to see as many of you as possible at Central URC as we mark this special moment.



Following on from that is the more formal side of Synod as we gather for a two part Autumnal Synod meeting. In these meetings we will listen for God's guidance as we decide on Synod's path over the next few years. First of all is the finance part of our agenda on the evening of Thursday 9th October where budgets and financial policies will take shape. Although seemingly a dry subject, this part of Synod's work is central to how we may become a more effective missional Synod, and which links in seamlessly with the agenda set out for the full day's Synod meeting at St Andrew's URC in Roundhay on Saturday 11th October. Here we will be engaging collaboratively on the missional, justice and youth engagement aspect of our Synod's life.



As I mentioned last time there are three workshops available and we invite Synod Representatives to join two of them during the day. They are:

Exploring Life, Love and Faith with Gen Z – Matthew Willmott, Frontier Youth Trust

Each generation understands the world slightly differently than the one before. How are Gen Z understanding life stages and in particular, what it means to be in a relationship? How can the church support, challenge and walk alongside young people as they make their way in the world? This is

just the starting point of a conversation that we need to be open to having.

Discipleship in Divided Times - Joint Public Issues Team (JPIT)

How might Christians engage in a political and social mainstream that is shifting into more populist and openly far-right views and expression? How can our conversations with friends and family reflect a sensitivity to these influences, build trust across difference yet challenge extreme-right policies that undermine democracy and Christian values? The Joint Public Issues Team will lead a workshop highlighting current trends in society, the impact these have on the most vulnerable, and how Christians can engage effectively in changing times.

The Gift of Presence: How children and young people can transform church life – Tony Harris and Tracey Winfrow

What difference does it make when children and young people are truly part of the life of the church—not just present, but participating, shaping, and belonging? This workshop invites you to explore how the presence of young people can breathe new life, perspective, and purpose into your church community. Through stories, reflection, and discussion, we'll uncover the theological, relational, and missional impact of engaging younger generations. Whether your church is growing with young people or longing for their return, this session will challenge and encourage you to see them not as the church of tomorrow, but as vital members of the church today.

Everyone will be able to attend 2 of the 3 on offer and choices can be made on the day, but we hope that by providing this information in advance, churches and synod representatives can share, discuss and consider their options. Those who are not synod representatives, but with an interest in the topics may also wish to attend. Everyone is welcome to come along and there will be creche facilities (unsupervised, in the main meeting hall) for babies and small children.

 A number of buses serve the Northen General Hospital, including the 29 between Fir Vale and High Green, 47/48 between Shire Green and Herdings, 75/76 between Low Edges and Meadowhall and the 88 between Bents Green and Ecclesfield, which all stop on Barnsley Road, opposite the church.

 We will stop for lunch at Firth Park Methodist Church. Please bring your own packed lunch.







All grant applications received during each quarter are distributed amongst the trustees prior to each meeting to review and recommend appropriate action to guide and support the final collective decision making process during the meetings. Do you need financial support for your church building project or significant repairs?



The Congregational & General Charitable Trust may be able to help

The C&G Trust is an independent grant-making charity which aims to support churches, particularly those of the United Reformed and Congregational denominations, in the provision and repair of suitable buildings. They make grants towards the overall care, upkeep and extension of churches and also offer grant funding toward the capital cost of church community projects.

The trust began as the charitable arm of the Congregational & General Insurance Company but became a separate charity and now is completely independent of the insurance company and distributes grants from the investment of the proceeds of the sale of that company in 2016.

What grants are available?

The level of grants available to churches range from £1,000 to a maximum of £25,000. Grants are usually capped at 25% of the total project cost. Grants are awarded for church or related community capital projects involving building work, repairs, improvements or extensions. Any project costing less than £1m in total will be considered. Consideration will also be given to smaller clearly defined and discrete project phases. There are a few exclusions including organ or bell restoration, stand-alone environmental projects such as solar panels or heat source pumps, manse works, conservation/restoration of works of art, graveyard or garden maintenance, parking provision and the running costs of the church.

How do I apply?

Applications should be made in advance of starting any work (apart from obtaining professional design and project planning advice) and be submitted when planning has proceeded to the point where clear details of the planned works and their expected cost can be provided.

Applications are considered quarterly (March, June, September and December of each calendar year) The upcoming application date for each quarter is published on the website at

https://www.candgtrust.org.uk/how-to-apply-funding-church-projects/ with further details and an application form available to download. The website also has a useful Q & A section as well as a sample completed application form for you to view. If you are unable to find all the answers to your questions, please contact us at admin@candgtrust.org.uk.

Applications must be supported by copies of your church accounts and documentation supporting the estimated cost of the project, such as Contractor quotes. There is an expectation that the church will contribute, so far as it is practicable, to the project from its own funds and from local fundraising.

The charity exists to help churches like yours – so please do not hesitate to apply if you feel we can be of help.

Put the date in your diary – Monday 24th November 2025.

Rod Morrison, of the **Synod's Eco Group** asks "Do you remember the old days, when your mum darned your socks, or put patches on the elbows of your school blazer? When you took your shoes to the cobblers to be reheeled, or unravelled that now-too-small jumper to knit a new one in a bigger size? It was repair, reuse, share, and upcycle – practices that we need to return to as we face the consequences of global warming; practices which we now call "circular consumption" - keeping resources in use and preventing waste. That's what "Circular Monday" is all about. Forget Black Friday, and celebrate Circular Monday instead, when we focus on keeping resources in use and preventing waste. Of course, we should be keeping resources in use and preventing waste all the time. But Monday 24th November is when there is a main event to promote "circular consumption"".

So why not join the Main Event for this year – on Circular Monday 24th November

It's just one hour – with big impact. It's online, and showcases how circular solutions are reshaping the world. Expect inspiration, global perspectives, and engaging voices leading the way towards a more sustainable future. If you want to take part, simply post a photo of yourself or your group on social media with #CircularMonday, showing something linked to reuse, repair, or renting.

But "Circular Monday" is more than just one day in a year.

Circular Monday began in 2017 in Malmö, Sweden, as a counter-movement to Black Friday. It is now an online campaigning community which highlights and celebrates businesses, organisations, and individuals that keep resources in use and prevent waste, making it easier for people everywhere to choose circular solutions. (see www.circularmonday.com)

The Circular Monday community aims to promote circular consumption by:

- Hosting an annual global action day (the main event Circular Monday the Monday before Black Friday)
- Building the world's largest database of circular businesses and changemakers
- Inspiring people to repair, reuse, rent, share, and upcycle instead of buying new.

At their main event, always the Monday before Black Friday, the year's campaign results are revealed. The goal is to make circular solutions visible, accessible, and the new normal.

As a guide, the Circular Monday community use the 12R strategies, including: Refuse, Reduce, Rethink, Redesign, Reuse, Repair, Refurbish, Remanufacture, Repurpose, Recycle, Re-earth, and (as a last resort) Recover. Recycling is considered baseline, not leadership so we encourage higher-value practices like reuse, repair, and redesign.

Anyone can join the Circular Monday community, both online and through local in-person activities or digital events. You can explore the Circular Monday database of circular businesses, or join as a volunteer. For ideas, check out @circularmonday on Instagram.

Why not join the online community yourself and start to consume circular – or at least think about which of the 12 Rs you can put into practice?

Important information from the Synod Safeguarding Team



Due to changes in the insurance industry, insurers are now adding a new safeguarding endorsement for churches to complete when their insurance is due for renewal. What this means is that insurance companies will now place conditions on all policies, that it these conditions must be adhered to for the policies to be valid.

What this means is that you will need to answer yes to the following questions –

- Have you a complete and comprehensive written safeguarding policy that is reviewed at least annually?
- Do you have a church safeguarding coordinator for your church?
- Do you as a church, provide safeguarding training to everyone who needs it due to their role within the church?
- Do you know how to respond to a safeguarding incident, know who to report it to and how to deal with it correctly?
- Has everyone who needs them, due to their role, had the correct level of DBS checks and has this been completed in the past three years?
- Have you and do you have a system to securely retain records of any abuse allegations and the action you took in relation to these allegations?

You would also need to make the insurance company aware if there have been any allegations of abuse which have been reported at your church.

The above relates to anybody involved in the church who works unsupervised with children or vulnerable adults or has unsupervised access to children or vulnerable adults. This means that everybody who falls under the guidance of Good Practice 6, which includes Elders etc need to make sure everything is up to date and in order, to be able to confirm this with the insurance company when the renewal is submitted.

If the answer is no, or the disclosure is incorrectly completed, insurance may be withheld or be made void in any claims. If this is the case and a claim is made it will be made against the church itself and the Trustees.

Many of you may already be able to answer yes to all the questions posed.


However, many of you may not be able to answer yes to all the questions and this is where action needs to be taken at the church.

The Elders/Trustees are responsible for ensuring that the church is a safe place for everyone and therefore responsible for making sure that you can answer all the questions posed by an insurance company to provide insurance cover for the church and everyone who attends. If you need help making sure your church can answer yes to all the questions you will be asked please contact the Synod Safeguarding Team by email (click here) and we will assist you in making sure your church can be insured correctly.

The Safeguarding team are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week and 365 days a year (and even 366 days in Leap Years!!). Details can be found on the Yorkshire website at https://urcyorkshire.org.uk/safeguarding/ and any query, either by phone or by e-mail at safeguarding.1and4@urc.org.uk will be answered within 24 hours.

FIRE SAFETY

Jane Bunyan, our Synod Property Officer property@urcyorkshire.org.uk has asked that I remind churches that fire regulations for small non-domestic premises have changed in light of the Grenfell Tower Enquiry outcomes.
