Lenten lines

I'm told that it is time to dig out the flour at the back of the cupboard, crack a few eggs, get the milk and the whisk and find a non-stick frying pan. For some people that is the way Lent starts, but for us Christians the real Lent begins the day afterwards on Ash Wednesday, which is upon us – it being next week on the 18th February. I could try to make something of the fasting element that some incorporate into Lent, but this year, with all that we are being invited to do, I would like to draw your attention to talking and praying. The "Talking About....." initiative led by the URC's Faith in Action team has returned with a series of events over the Spring, Summer and Autumn. The first one is next week on Ash Wednesday on LGBTQ+ and Inclusive Language, and is followed roughly four weekly on many other topics which will be of interest to you all. As for praying, we have the World Day of Prayer on March 6th. I know that there are events at Westfield Wyke URC and at Portholme Church Selby, but there is still time to let me know of any other events or services over that weekend. The invitation to events continue to roll in, and I am ever so grateful for those who let me know of what is going on in their circles. Please continue to send invitations to your events in to me, and I'll continue to advertise them. One invitation that will be heading towards your church's Synod representatives is to join us at West Park URC, Harrogate, on Saturday March 14th for the Spring meeting of the Yorkshire Synod. Plans for the day are being put together, so hopefully when the next issue of the Briefing is published, I'll be able to bring more details to the fore. Watch this Space – and church Synod reps – watch your inbox. At Synod meetings we resolve to appoint people to our committees and groups, the people to help guide and steer Synod, but one of the things that we have noticed is that we are still short of volunteers to fill these key roles, especially on the financial and property side of things. If you know of someone who you think would be suitable, let me know and we will approach them.

Yorkshire Synod Discipleship Development Small Grant Fund 2026

The Synod is pleased to let you all know that it has received confirmation that it has a pot of £4000 to grant to those wishing to apply to the Yorkshire Synod Discipleship Development 2026.

1. Who is eligible to apply? Committed members or adherents, including children and young people, of a congregation within the United Reformed Church who are exercising, or want to exercise, a form of lay ministry or community service whether expressed within or beyond their local church. The DDF is not open to Ministers of Word and Sacraments and CRCWs, as there are other designated funds available for those groups.
2. How much is available? Up to £300 per applicant per calendar year, although the Synod may agree to more than this according to the local context and circumstances.
3. What can this money be used for? The purposes for which the funding is provided are defined by creativity and vocation, in line with the URC's discipleship development strategy. Be bold, take risks. The funding exists to help you to follow Jesus. You might be helped in this by courses (at any level) at any of the URC Resource Centres for Learning or from other learning providers, or you may have ideas on resourcing discipleship development in other people. You may need funds to cover the costs of travel, materials or books. All you have to do is make a case to your local church meeting and submit the application form to the Synod Convenor of Ministries for consideration and, if appropriate, authorisation.
4. How are applications made? Having gained your church meeting's endorsement, applications are to be made on the designated form, well before the spending is due to start. Backdated applications will not normally be accepted. Application forms are obtainable from the Synod Convenor of Ministries via the Synod Office at office@urcyorkshire.org.uk and should be sent back for authorisation before being passed to the synod finance office.
5. How are grants paid? Grants authorised by the Convenor of Synod Ministries are paid by a Synod finance officer by reimbursement to you when you have given proof of what you've spent. Contact your Synod Convenor of Ministries for discussion if you need something funded directly on your behalf, rather than waiting for re-imbursement.

Remember this is for any age of lay person in our churches to apply for so please discuss with your young people as well as adults.

Community Project Awards

For 28 years, the United Reformed Church's (URC) Community Project Awards have recognised outstanding community projects in local URCs and churches in ecumenical partnerships, that demonstrate the love of God and the mission of the Church by reaching out in many different ways to help the local communities in which they serve.

The partner of the awards for the past 17 years has been <https://www.congregational.co.uk/>. Since the awards began, more than 80 churches have received £150,000 in support. From 2025, the total amount offered to church projects was increased to £10,000.

Revd Dr Simon Cross, who serves in the Hull URC Partnership, is instrumental in organising this event due to take place at Westminster College, Cambridge (and online) on the 21st of March called:

The Quiet Revival: Myth, memory or movement?

Simon writes: *I dare say that you will have either read or at least heard about the report from the Bible Society, last year, which talked about a 'Quiet Revival' in church attendance amongst young people. You may also have seen, read, or heard some of the discussion about that report – maybe even the British Social Attitudes Survey which offered a starkly 'alternative' picture.*

In order to shed some light on this confused and confusing picture I've asked some clever and well-informed people to take part in a 'symposium' – each of them will present a short paper and there will be room for discussion after each one. As well as some leading social scientists and international researchers I've invited some well-placed church figures, and a resident expert in the history of British revivals. We will also hear, directly, from one of the authors of the original Bible Society report.

I'm not saying we're definitely going to get to the bottom of whether there really is a 'quiet revival' going on, or not, (and if there is – whether that's good, bad, or... something else) but we will, at least, have a better sense of what that might mean... I hope.

Look at it this way: if nothing else you can have a day with some very clever and interesting people... and me.

I'd love you to be able to join us for the event, either in person or – indeed – online (nothing to stop you organising a watch party, by the way). Thanks to a generous grant we've kept the prices as low as possible – the in person ticketing is tiered too, so if you're feeling flush you can chip in a little more to help us make sure we cover the costs. There are only a limited number of 'in person' tickets available (if everyone receiving this email got a ticket, we'd be full) – so if you're keen to be in the room, then my advice is to book early.

(And if you're fortunate enough to have a 'training budget' or similar – then this will, I'm sure, qualify. I mean, it might not... I don't really know. To be fair - it's a guess.)


Submit your photographs for the 2027 URC Calendar



LISTED BUILDINGS NEWS

We have a message from the Synod's Property Officer, Jane Bunyan, which is of interest to all of you who worship in and care for the Synod's Listed Buildings.

Dear Friends

Firstly, thank you for everything that you do to maintain the buildings you care for and I need to remind everyone that ALL buildings within the curtilage of your grounds are listed, not just the bits that appear on the listing with Historic England! This includes church halls and any outbuildings etc. If you are not sure please check with me in the office, especially as the Synod Property committee should always be advised of works to Listed buildings.

Secondly, if you have done any works on your buildings (including architects fees etc) in 2025, you can claim the VAT back on these up to a value of £25,000. This needs claimed before 31st March 2026, and I suggest doing so sooner rather than later, in case the pot runs out. The link to start that claim is this one <https://listed-places-of-worship-grant.dcms.gov.uk/>. Several United Reformed Churches in our synod would have been eligible for more in 2025 if the cap had not been in place, as would major historic buildings such as York Minister, or St Michael-le-Belfry in York, Ripon Cathedral and Leeds Minster.

*Thirdly and most importantly, this scheme is **NOT** being renewed in 2026. It is being replaced with a new grant funding system and some detail on it can be found here <https://questions-statements.parliament.uk/written-statements/detail/2026-01-22/hlws1266>.*

*It is called the **PLACES OF WORSHIP RENEWAL FUND** and is the result of successful lobbying by many heritage organisations who feared the loss of relief on the work done to historic buildings and it does indicate that the government acknowledges the importance of these listed buildings.*

And Finally The Wonders of Withernsea

Debra Milnes, the Church Secretary at Withernsea URC contacted us recently with a report of what they are doing in their community. Withernsea is a small place right on the edge of Yorkshire Synod and its great to share their news of how a small church can have a big impact in its community. Here is what she said:



"Withernsea URC is a small church set in a seaside town with 4 serving and 1 retired Elders and 11 members. We have our Breaking of Bread Service Weekly with a time of prayer beforehand for those who wish to attend, we also have a weekly Bible Study Group, Weekly Prayer Meeting. There is a fellowship group (Fairhaven) every Tuesday for adults and we meet for Seated Aerobics each Friday. Both are open to the church family as well as those from outside of the church.

We are part of Withernsea Churches Together who are busy in the town with monthly services in three of the Residential Homes for the elderly. This is a wonderful opportunity to meet and chat with those who are unable to get to church. We also support the Messy Gazebo (Children's Work) which is set up and manned by members of Churches Together during the festival weekends in the town, and is enjoyed by our folks as we do not have children at our Sunday Services.

The Holderness Gazette is our local weekly paper and the town's churches take it in turn to write the 'Thought of the Week Column' once each month with our thought being printed every 3rd week in the month. Another wonderful opportunity to share our faith with those outside.

We have a Church Pantry with the food being donated by the church folks, with support from the Anglican church who collect food, and make small monetary gifts to support the project. Each foodbag has enough food to last for three days (similar to that of Trussell Trust), we also provide toiletries, nappies and wash powder when available. We take referrals from the Children's Centre, Citizens Advice, Social Workers, Church Oversight, other Churches in the Town.

Pet Food Donations are gifted to us via another charity in the town who pass on to us items which they cannot use (damaged packs etc) which we pass on to those who struggle to feed their pets.

Fairtrade Project – We are matched with Tesco – Withernsea who provide us with food stuffs, flowers, plants, clothing, toys, cards, seeds and much more. The food is collected twice weekly, sorted and delivered the same evening with 7-10 bags most weeks but can rise to 17-20 bags. The deliveries are made to families who are struggling we are happy to accept self-referral as well as referral from outside agencies. Non-food items are donated to other charities such as Shoebox Appeal, Smalls for all. With seeds going to the town gardening group.

We are keen to support a number of charities including LIFT, Tear Fund, Leprosy Mission, Christian Aid, Shoe Box Appeal, MAF, and make donations as emergencies occur. We also collect new baby items and make up Baby Packs to be given to new mothers who are in need. We also make a selection of Christmas Packs for new mothers. We have folks who knit baby hats and canula sleeves for the Baby Unit and NICU as they are always in need.

We are also a keen “ECO” Church but perhaps not in the way many churches think of as eco. We have recycle bins in the church office and kitchen to encourage recycling. We also collect and deliver thin plastics to our local supermarket. We collect milk bottle tops, stamps, postcards, good quality ladies’ foundation garments to support charities.

We have a rail for good second-hand clothing and footwear, where donations can be left, and can be purchased for a small donation. We also have a supply of clothing and household items which can be gifted to anyone in great need of support.

We have a Jigsaw swap and books which can be taken for a small donation or swapped.

Our church garden houses Bird Feeders and Insect Hotels, with the bird food donated by a couple of the elders. Our caretaker has planted fruit trees, with the idea that if they fruit, it can be taken by anyone who is in need. We also have a compost bin at the rear of the car park.

We are a small church but desire to further the Lord’s work in Withernsea. To God be the glory.”
